

Project: Leadership

Last newsletter, I mentioned that our district is nearing the end of a two-year project. It is actually an 18-month project. We committed to raise \$5,000 to purchase one-half of a well in South Sudan. Girls and women in this country sometimes walk up to 12 miles daily to get water. Each club has been asked to raise \$455 towards our district goal. Some clubs reached into their treasury. Others sold Christmas wreaths and bows. Several clubs encouraged clubwomen to "Be the Change" and collect spare change. Some clubs have put collection jars in the community, and others have partnered with other community organizations. Some have held 50/50 raffles, and one club got a grant from their foundation for 3 times the amount requested. We held a Penny War at the district meeting. This brought us \$507.44, and we also had a lot of fun.

At our Spring District Meeting on March 22 at Sewell Mill in Bremen, GA, we will present a check for over \$5,000 to the man who started

the foundation - Wells for Hope for South Sudan. Of course, there will be two regular cashable checks and another enormous poster-size check for photos. We will also receive a copy of the tile that will be put on the well with our name on it. We have invited the news media to come make a story about this as we are presenting it on World Water Day.

If you want to join us, our meeting will begin at 10:00 AM and will cost \$25 to register.



(Woman's Clubs - 16 to 35 membership category) This award is named for Nellie Peters Black, the GFWC Georgia President from 1916-1919, who served during wartime and worked to support women's right to vote.



# MARY LIPSCOMB BEST OVERALL CATEGORY 3 AWARD: (Woman's

Clubs – 36 and over membership category) This award is named for Mary Lipscomb, who served as the GFWC Georgia President from 1906-1909 and was the



driving force in the formation of Tallulah Falls School.

In the December newsletter, I discussed the importance of organizing and preserving your club's minutes to maintain an accurate record of our history. That article on the state website sparked interest and raised several questions about what records to keep and for how long, particularly from our older clubs.

Why Preservation Matters—While today's meeting minutes may seem routine or ordinary, they will be treasured decades from now. Future clubwomen will want to know about our priorities, initiatives, and even the cost of hosting events. Preserving these records ensures that our legacy remains intact and accessible, serving as a bridge between our organization's past, present, and future.

For additional guidance, I reached out to Joanna Church, librarian at the Women's History Resource Center of our national organization, for her expert advice. Joanna was incredibly responsive and shared valuable insights. She also shared a comprehensive document outlining best practices for preserving historical minutes, which I've included as a resource for your reference. I encourage all clubs to review their current documentation processes and consider how they might improve preservation efforts. A Guide to Preserving and Writing Club History.

Our history is priceless, and preserving it is a responsibility we all share. Together, let's ensure that future generations can look back on our accomplishments and be inspired by the dedication and vision of today's clubwomen.

Here are a few Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs) based on the information Joanna shared:

### 1. How long should records be kept?

**Answer**: Key documents, like meeting minutes, charters, bylaws, and significant financial records, should be maintained indefinitely. These records capture the essence of your club's history and initiatives, offering invaluable context for future generations. All of these are great records for future researchers.

### 2. What types of records should be preserved?

**Answer:** Meeting minutes and agendas, Financial reports and budgets, Membership rolls and officer lists, Newsletters, programs, event flyers, Photographs, and press clippings related to club activities

# 3. Where should these records be stored?

Answer: Storing documents in a climate-controlled environment, away from light, heat, and moisture, is best for long-term preservation. Acid-free folders and boxes can help prevent deterioration.

\*From Cimi: Refer to the December article; your women's history chairman can possibly help in scanning your materials to a Google Drive.

# 4. Does GFWC want any of these historical minutes or items?

**Answer:** Our policy is to help clubs and federations find other repositories for these materials rather than collecting them ourselves (this is essentially a storage issue, but we also like to help things stay in their home state). The WHRC is kind of a "repository of last resort" if need be, the last step before the trash can, but we prefer to see things go to universities, libraries, or historical societies nearby. We sometimes accept artifacts and memorabilia, as many repositories are archives-only and can't accept a quilt or a trophy. (We also are happy to receive historical summaries of clubs, whether a one-page note or an entire book – we don't generally take a whole collection of minutes, scrapbooks, and the like.) We are happy to help you and your members identify potential repositories - including some places, like the Atlanta History Center, that might be willing to add to an existing collection - and discuss any artifacts that might need to come to the WHRC.

# 5. If we digitalize the minutes - does GFWC want us to share them for inclusion in your women's resource digital collection?

Answer: In this case, we would prefer to record the best way to access those digitized materials so that we can share them with interested researchers (and use them ourselves if needed), but we wouldn't want to host the digital files here or add them officially to our collections database. I have a spreadsheet of physical and digital resources organized by state that I can pull up if people are interested in particular states/counties/clubs, and I am always thrilled to add new details! Depending on the digital asset management challenges you might come up against, we can help find the right solution, and if need be, we can be a last resort for file hosting.

# Treasurer - You are Important!!

Many don't realize how vital The Treasurer's position is to every club's success.

The Treasurer has many responsibilities including:



- Paying all the club's obligations on a timely basis. This
  includes knowing and tracking the due dates of obligations such as storage rental, insurance, GFWC Georgia
  dues, and other items.
- 2. Depositing all funds on a timely basis.
- 3. Keeping an accurate record of the club's financial transactions. Google Sheets, Microsoft Excel, QuickBooks, and other software are excellent tools for keeping accurate records. These software programs also produce financial reports, which make reporting easier. The records should be saved for future reference.
- Providing critical information for the club's annual report on donations to organizations and funds spent on projects.
- 5. Reporting the cash balance at each meeting to members. This will make all finances transparent to the members.

- 6. Keeping track of collecting dues from members.
- 7. Balancing the bank account monthly which is critical. With all the bank fraud, this is the only way to confirm that all transactions are legitimate.
- 8. Comparing the budget to the actual expenses allows the club to track spending and make good decisions.
- 9. Use leadership skills, which are necessary to keep your executive board on track.
- 10. Reimbursing members for expenses with proper expense reports and receipts.
- 11. If applicable, providing all necessary information for the 501(c)(3) tax return.
- 12. Performing other miscellaneous duties and following all control procedures.

As you can see, the club Treasurer is very busy. Be sure to tell her, "Thank You," for keeping your club's money and financial records accurate.

GFWC clubs are encouraged to focus on efforts to educate their community members in the life-saving skills of CPR and First Aid. A citation is given to a Woman's or Junior Club doing the most outstanding and innovative work in CE and Outreach Community Connection Initiative.

Please review the <u>GFWC Civic Engagement Plan of Work</u> on how your club can become involved.

### Example:

Stone Mountain Woman's Club- CPR Class – 57 Members, 112 Hours, \$0 Donated \$560 Raised \$0 Spent \$100 In-Kind

During American Heart Association Month, 28 club members participated in a CPR class lead by a Certified Professional. Members learned Basic Life Support for children, infants and adults performing the seven steps of CPR. Members were also taught now to use an AED machine. Members practiced Hands on Chest Compression and Rescue Breathing techniques. A donation of \$50 was made to the American Heart Association for the District President's Project.

Another way GFWC members can prepare themselves and save others is to create a <u>Family Emergency Binder</u> in case you need to leave home quickly due to a disaster in your community. Include pertinent information that might be lost or needed if you can't return home immediately — contact information.

# Hey, are you willing to get your hands dirty?

Cathy Jones has challenged us to be better stewards of the earth. This

year's President's Challenge suggests that we strive to support community garden spots and create more beautiful communities by picking up trash along highways, waterways, and walking trails. Community gardens contribute significantly to environmental sustainability. As plants absorb rainwater, there is reduced runoff on streets, minimizing the flow of pollutants into water bodies such as rivers, streams, and lakes. Composting in these gardens helps reduce overall waste production, thereby decreasing the amount of landfill contributions. Community gardens allow us to work with our neighbors to address the problems of rising food prices and the ever-present reality of food insecurity.

Let's take a quick mental quiz on community gardening and state and national parks...

Would it be possible for your club to hold a community workshop on sustainable gardening? Is there a suitable place to plant a garden at home, near a clubhouse, or within your community? Is there space that might be used for a compost pile? Do you reach out to fellow citizens by working together to create an opportunity to grow together as a community? HB561 – Okefenokee Protection Act – a Bill to be entitled an Act to amend Part 3 of Article 2 of Chapter 4 of Title 12 of the Official Code of Georgia annotated, relating to surface mining, so as to prohibit the director of the Environmental Protection Division of the Natural Resources Department from issuing, modifying or renewing any permit or accepting any bond to conduct surface mining operations on Trail Ridge for future permit applications and amendments; to provide a definition; to provide for legislative findings; to provide for related matters; to repeal conflicting laws; and for other purposes.

#### **March is National Nutrition Month**

For your monthly club meeting, have a healthy potluck or a recipe makeover contest, cutting calories and increasing the nutritional value of the recipe!

National Nutrition Month® is an annual campaign created 50 years ago in 1973 by the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics. During the month of March, everyone is invited to learn about making informed food choices and developing healthy eating and physical activity habits.

This year's theme is "Food Connects Us." Food is a connecting factor for many of us. It connects us to our cultures, our families, and our friends. Sharing a meal is an opportunity to learn about its preparation, who made it, and where the ingredients were sourced. Health, memories, traditions, seasons, and access can all impact our relationship with food. While these factors influence the foods we eat, the foods we eat also affect our health.

### **Eating Right for Older Adults**

Food, Nutrition and Health Tips from the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics

### Make half your plate fruits and vegetables

Eat a variety of different-colored vegetables, including dark green, red, and orange ones. Beans, peas, and lentils are also good choices. Fresh, frozen, and canned vegetables can all be healthful options. Look for "reduced sodium" or "no-salt-added" on the labels. Add fruit to meals, snacks, or desserts. Choose dried, fro-

zen, or canned fruits in water or 100% juice, as well as fresh fruits.

### • Make at least half your grains whole

Choose breads, cereals, crackers, and noodles made with 100% whole grains. Whole-grain corn tortillas, brown rice, bulgur, millet, amaranth, and oats all count as whole grains, too. Also, look for fiber-rich cereals to help you stay regular and cereals that are fortified with vitamin B12, a nutrient that decreases in absorption as we age or due to some medications.


### • Switch to fat-free or low-fat milk, yogurt, and cheese

Older adults need more calcium and vitamin D to help keep bones healthy. Daily, include three servings of fat-free or lowfat milk, yogurt, or cheese. If you are lactose intolerant, try lactose-free milk or a calcium-fortified soy beverage.

### • Vary your protein choices

Eat a variety of foods from the protein food group each week.

In addition to lean meat, poultry, and eggs, choose seafood, nuts, beans, peas, and lentils when planning your meals. Spread your protein intake throughout the day by including a source with meals and spacks. Protein



### • Limit sodium, saturated fat, and added sugars

Look out for salt or sodium in foods you eat. Compare sodium in the foods you buy and choose those with lower amounts. Add spices or herbs to season food without adding salt. Switch from solid fats to oils when preparing foods. Make primary sources of saturated fats an occasional choice, not an everyday food. Examples include desserts, fried foods, pizza, and processed meats like sausages and hot dogs. Select fruit for dessert more often instead of treats with added sugars.

### • Stay well-hydrated

Drink plenty of water throughout the day to help prevent dehydration and promote good digestion. Other beverages that can help meet fluid needs include unsweetened beverages, like low-fat and fat-free milk, fortified soy beverages, and 100-percent fruit juices. Choose these more often in place of sugary drinks.

### • Enjoy your food, but be mindful of portion sizes

Most older adults need fewer calories than in younger years. Avoid oversized portions. Try using smaller plates, bowls, and glasses.

## Cook more often at home, where you control what's in your food

When ordering out, look for dishes that include vegetables, fruits, whole grains, and lean protein. When portions are large, share a meal or save half for later.



Looking ahead, some project suggestions include:



Order pinwheels, have a sign made that your club supports Child Abuse Prevention Month, and get approval from a prominent location in your community to plant the gardens. Create a Prevent Child Abuse fact sheet and a pinwheel coloring sheet and pass them out to childcare centers, dining establishments catering to children, pediatrician offices,

HB582- The Survivors Justice Act passed out of Leverett Sub-Committee and is on to Full Judiciary Non-Civil Committee.

# Say YES To HB582 - The Survivor Justice Act! — The GA Coalition

Against Domestic Violence reports that HB582 passed unanimously out of the Leverett sub-committee of the House Judiciary Non-Civil Committee and is headed to full committee! Once it passes out of full committee, it goes to Rules; if it passes out of Rules, it goes to the House floor for a vote. For this to happen, need your help is needed because survivors are sometimes criminalized for acting in response to abuse, either in self-defense against their abusive partners or for acting under the direction of their abusive partners. Many survivors report that they felt that they had no choice but to comply with their abusers or else they would endure significant harm. No matter the circumstances, survivors consistently report that they felt that they were choosing between two terrible options: risking their lives at the hands of their abusers or trying to save themselves (and their children) through an action or inaction that could lead to criminal consequences. Many survivors say they felt that they had no choice at all. HB582 allows the courts to meaningfully and adequately consider the history of abuse in determining a person's culpability and sentence when abuse was a significant contributing factor in their actions.



- blue ribbon pin or blue clothing when doing projects to bring awareness.
- Plan, organize, and execute an Easter project for kids in your area, either for a Domestic Violence center through DFCS or CASA. Consider socks, sundry items, and school supplies.
- Start planning and organizing a Mother's Day event at a local domestic violence center. Projects may be breakfast for the moms, giving each mom a spa or tea basket with a journal and pen, or organizing a shopping experience where the kids pick out a gift for the mom.
- April is National Sexual Assault Awareness Month. The purpose is to raise public awareness about sexual assault and educate communities and individuals on how to prevent sexual violence. Visit the National Sexual Violence Resource Center website to gather information on planning a SAAM event. - May is Older Americans Month. Contact a nursing home and find out what items they need. Gather the items and take them to the residents. Organize an activity like Bingo with the residents. They always enjoy snacks, singing, and games.



#### What is CPR?

Communications and Public Relations, or CPR for short, is the lifesaving aspect of GFWC. Membership gets the members, and leadership trains them, but CPR educates, engages, and empowers our members.

There are so many aspects of CPR: branding, public relations, club communications, website, social media, and digital meetings, to name a few.

The core components of CPR are — the "C"— Communications and, in particular, club communications, and "PR"—Public Relations. You ask, what is the difference? In general, we think of communications as how we relate to/interact with our members, while public relations is how we relate to/interact with our communities and broader audiences. Yes, these two can overlap and often do.

Communications and Public Relations can take many forms – visual, written, digital, and audible. Creating crucial, necessary, and viable communication tools for your club is essential to its health and survival. When devising a CPR strategy for your club, keep two things in mind:

 Remember the goals – educate, engage, empower – and keep these in mind with all your CPR tools. The adage "knowledge is power" is true. The more we are informed about all aspects of GFWC, the more engaged we become

as members. Engaged members are more satisfied, will see more value in their membership, and will participate in more activities. In other words, they become empowered to further GFWC's mission and goals by remaining organization members.

2) Recognize that most clubs are multigenerational. Each generation processes information differently and has its own language and priorities. You may have members of the Silent Generation (1927-1945) who prefer printed materials and phone calls rather than electronic messages and digital publications. And Generation Z (1997-2012) may want everything sent so they can read it from their smartphones. The key is to be cognizant of these differences and to plan accordingly.

Have you been following the Georgia Legislative Session? You can keep up to date by visiting <a href="www.legis.ga.gov">www.legis.ga.gov</a>, which provides ALL the happenings Under the Dome with LIVE broadcasts! Just to mention a few areas, do you know what's being proposed in Creative Arts and Entertainment, Education, Public and Community Health? Sounds like our CSPs...right? Well, let's visit that website often and stay informed about our state's legislative work! A great project to do in conjunction with following the current legislative session would be for club CSP chairs to share with club sisters the latest Georgia General Assembly news that directly relates to their specific areas.

Did you join us at GFWC GA's Capitol Day? On February 6, GFWC GA clubwomen joined the GA Coalition Against Domestic Violence to advocate for the protection of domestic violence survivors. We met with members of the House and Senate, shared our "asks," and gave them our "leave-behinds." Time remains for all clubwomen to advocate during this session. The Steps for GFWC Advocacy include 1) Educate yourself on the issue, 2) Time your advocacy efforts, so they coincide when legislation is debated, or budget requests are in progress, 3) Share your personal story, 4) Build relationships with your representatives, and 5) Follow-up and say thank you. In regard to Step #4, a BIG SHOUT OUT to the LaFayette Woman's Club! Rep. Mike Cameron is most definitely aware of their club's presence in his district.



GFWC GA was recognized for our past Legislative Actions. Check out <u>GFWC 2024 Federal Legislative Priorities and Successes</u> (118th Congress, 2022-2024).

Not only will you read about GFWC legislative efforts in the CSP areas, you will read about state federations that used the Legislative Action Center like our state did. Here's what is written about Georgia: GFWC-Georgia was successful in utilizing the GFWC Legislative Action Center to activate its members. Working closely with the Georgia Coalition Against Domestic Violence, GFWC Georgia supported legislation that creates a victim-centered address confidentiality programs for survivors of human trafficking, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking. GFWC-Georgia was proud to attend the bill-signing ceremony with Governor Brian Kemp.

During 2024-2026, GFWC clubs are challenged to "step up" to EDUCATE, ENGAGE, and EMPOW-ER through specific Legislative advocacy steps that do not need to be completed sequentially. Clubs achieving 35 or more points will be recognized during the 2025 and 2026 GFWC Annual Conventions. AND YOU know where the 2025 Convention is being held - Atlanta, Georgia! Wouldn't it be awesome for your club to be recognized at the upcoming international convention? Now, achieving 35 points is not out of reach. If your club increases enrollment by 10% annually in the Legislative Action Center (LAC), you will earn 25 points!

Whenever there is a current legislative issue important to GFWC members (like domestic violence, online safety for children, or support for Alzheimer's patients and caregivers), LAC members are alerted. They may take action immediately if they choose to do so. The Legislative Action Center also allows members to research current national and state-based legislation! So, please discuss this information in your clubs and encourage others to join! Our goal is that each state club will increase their LAC membership by 10% - and that's very doable! Additionally, EACH CLUB SISTER will complete GFWC GA's State President "Cathy Jones' President's Challenge" – to join the LAC!

So, let's aim to be recognized in 2025 and 2026 for our work on GFWC's Legislative Ladder!



Another way to add points to your club's Legislative Ladder is to connect a club project to a GFWC Resolution. Explaining the relationship between the club project and resolution will add 15 points to your score. Let's see, 25 points for LAC membership and 15 points for project and resolution equals 40 points, and with that total score, your club will be recognized at the annual GFWC Convention!

WHEREAS, Educational professionals, including teachers, teacher assistants, and other educational staff, are often underpaid, overworked, and under-appreciated, resulting in burnout and shortages, and

WHEREAS, Wages directly affect the ability of school districts to recruit and retain educational professionals; and WHEREAS, Educational professionals regularly purchase essential school supplies in excess of the deduction allowed by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS); therefore RESOLVED, That the General Federation of Women's Clubs urges its member clubs to:

- Advocate for increased local, state, and federal funding to offer educational professionals a living wage, which will encourage quality teacher candidates as well as the retention of all educational professionals;
- Endorse increasing the allowable deduction for essential school supplies;
- Support educational professionals through donations of classroom supplies, adopt-a-classroom-type programs, and recognition events.

**EXAMPLE of a CLUB PROJECT:** Many GFWC GA clubs support local schools by providing school supplies, teacher treats, and student recognition in the arts. Such endeavors and outreach are directly related to GFWC Resolution 150-045. This example is one of several that clubs can provide on the Legislative Ladder.

# **Georgia Women of Achievement**

DID YOU KNOW? The Georgia Women of Achievement (GWA) recognizes women natives or residents of Georgia for their significant achievements or statewide contributions. Former First Lady of Georgia and the United States, Rosalyn Carter, approached Wesleyan College in Macon with the idea of establishing a similar center in Georgia to recognize Georgia's distinguished women following an appearance at the Alabama Women's Hall of Fame in Judson, AL in 1988. After an enthusiastic response, a planning committee was formed and the idea was well on its way to fruition. In 1992, the first honorees — Martha McChesney Berry, Lucy Craft Laney, Juliette Gordon Low, Sara Barnham Matthews, and Flannery O'Connor — became the first inductees into the Georgia Women of Achievement.

Each year, to celebrate Women's History Month, a ceremony is held at Wesleyan College to honor outstanding Georgia women. Since its inception, GWA has maintained its core mission to honor the many inspirational and courageous female trailblazers of Georgia, to uphold their legacies, to encourage others to follow their examples by using their own unique talents, and to educate Georgia's youth about these outstanding role models.

This year's induction ceremony and luncheon will take place on March 5, 2025, at the Pierce Chapel at Wesleyan College and will honor Jessye Mae Norman, recitalist and arts advocate and Alma Woodsey Thomas, artist and educator.



Community service projects for the 2025 GFWC IDS can focus on any area of domestic and sexual violence. Here are eight areas your club might consider:



# **GFWC Gainesville Phoenix Woman's Club** By Debbie Brown

Our club wrapped up the last quarter of 2024 with a booth at Mule Camp Market in October. We had information and pictures about our club, harassed local businesses for raffle items, and secured a raffle license from the Sheriff's office. We raffled off UGA tailgate items and chairs, a \$150 Spa Gift Certificate, and a wreath. We made \$1600 selling \$5 raffle tickets and water and had 9 ladies interested in our club.

We invited those 9 potential members to a Membership Meetup where we explained our club, the CSP areas, and our community outreach. Several of these ladies have attended some of our events and meetings.

We set up a Witch on the Square in downtown Gainesville to raise awareness for the club and our CSP areas. On Halloween, several members helped our DV center hand out candy to the kids trick-or-treating on the square in an effort to support the DV shelter.

We participated in Treats for Troops, which packs care boxes for our troops.

For Veterans Day, we put up a Veterans wreath with our name on it at Veterans Park in Gainesville. This park is also part of the Greenway Trail, which thousands of people travel each week.

We partnered with the local DV center to help them with their Christmas party for the residents. We provided board games for the families, activities for the children, and a momshopping experience for the kids. The kids love this part—they get to pick out something for their mom!

We also adopted a family for Christmas through the Hall County Christmas Collaborative. A single mom who was just finishing her education. She had a 6-month-old girl and a 6-year-old boy. Our members were so generous; the kids received two pairs of shoes each, 7 outfits each, books, games, toys, and stuffed animals. We also included some cash and gift cards for the mom to use. Several ladies donated items for the mom, too. When the items were dropped off, they were living in a trailer with the grandmother and Aunt. The female sundry items were very well received, and all the stuff was for the kids.

We held a reporting workshop with the CSPs and Advancement areas and held our December meeting as a Christmas party at a local restaurant.

We are also adding Ladies Time Out (LTO) events to have some social time. Before our meetings, we attended a theatre performance and visited many restaurants in the area. We may need to rename our outings to Ladies' Time Eating.

For 2024, we had 81 projects, spent 10,025 hours, donated \$60,171.54, raised \$28,742, spent \$9,477, and donated \$21,070 in kind.

In 2025, we had a planning retreat scheduled, but the snow had us all hunkered down in our homes. We are planning a fund-raiser and have spent time evaluating different entertainment options. We supported our local women's homeless shelter by sponsoring Jeff Foxworthy for the entertainment at their annual fundraiser, Gala.

Our local hospital expanded, and we toured the opening of the new tower with its state-of-the-art emergency center and 3 Trauma rooms that will support NE GA. We saw a demonstration of a heart robot and all the different heart-related operating rooms. In addition, we met several staff members who are good contacts for future projects with the hospital. We also had someone interested in hearing more about our club.

We held a Vision Board workshop at a local library.

We invited the President and CEO of the Hall Chamber of Commerce to our February meeting, and he enlightened us on the progress in the area. He shared information on the Inland Port in Gainesville, which is being called the Blue Ridge Connector, and how it will assist in reducing the number of trucks on the roads from Savannah to Gainesville. He also mentioned the companies in the area that do a lot of philanthropic work. So, we have some additional contacts for sponsorships.

We are looking forward to our Awards Banquet in March.

### **GFWC Lilburn Woman's Club** By Kathy Mattox


In late 2024, we approved funding for a Bookmobile project to



support the literacy issues in our area. The project kicked off in January 2025. This is being coordinated with the **Gwinnett County Public** School (GCPS) Bookmobile program. We requested that the representative from GCPS coordinate dates with each local elementary school

in Lilburn to send the GCPS Bookmobile. Each student in Grades K-5 is allowed to board a Bookmobile bus and select a book of their choice to keep. The books are organized on the bus by reading level. LWC pays the fees for the bus to visit the school and pays for all the books the students

choose. We are offering our assistance at the schools with



and helping keep the lines for students boarding the bus and re-entering the school. We really enjoyed working with the students on this project, which has truly been rewarding. Over 8,000

is expected to be around \$14,500, which covers the cost of the visit and the books. The project is scheduled to be completed in May 2025.

We held our third annual Taste of Lilburn event on March 1, 2025. It was a huge success!

We had over a dozen sponsors for the event. Over 20 restaurants agreed to participate, offering samples from Around the World! We provided entertainment from several local bands, Parkview High School's Mariachi Band, and their Orchestra Band. In addition, we held a student Art Contest from three local Middle Schools and displayed the top three entries from each school at the event, giving our students well-deserved recognition for their talent! The proceeds from this event will be used to help fund our Scholarship, Bookmobile, Constitution, and Dictionary Projects, as well as local food pantries.

We have kicked off our Scholarship Applications, and during March, we will be judging the entries and preparing for our May reception, where we honor the scholarship winners, the Teachers of the Year, and our Citizen of the Year! This event typically brings over 75 people to our meeting, including families of all the honorees. We will also present any awards the club has won from the District and State at this event to show the community our commitment.
