
## First Vice President/President-Elect Peggy Wilson

hats from the hat racks and pose together for photos.





#### The Importance of Digital Legacy Planning


A Recording Secretary plays a crucial role in documenting official meetings, maintaining accurate records, and organizing key documents for their club or organization. However, this responsibility extends beyond just meeting minutes—it also involves establishing a structured system for preserving important templates, forms, and historical records.

If your club does not have a centralized Google Drive for essential documents—and instead, each leader is saving records individually to their personal drive, iPad, etc. —this article is for you. Actually, this article is for everyone to apply in their personal lives as it provides guidance not only for club record-keeping and access to the same, but also for your personal archives, including meaningful family momentos and photos for your family members.

I'm talking about digital legacy planning—ensuring that your personal or club's important records that may be kept on your iPad, iPhone, or personal Google Drive are preserved and accessible to your family and for the future. I encourage you to take a moment to read this article and reflect on how you manage your own personal digital legacy.

As many of you know, my mother and quasi-sister-in-law passed away unexpectedly in November and December. Through these difficult times, I've learned some valuable information about digital legacy planning that I want to share.

In today's world, so much of our lives—photos, accounts, and important information—are tied to our phones, social media, and devices like



To prevent your loved ones from facing a similar situation, I strongly encourage everyone to take a few minutes to set up a Legacy Contact on your Apple devices. This allows a trusted person or family member to access your information or reset your device, if needed. You can do this by going to Settings [Your Name], Sign-in and Security, Legacy Contact, and following the instructions. Apple will provide an ID number that your designated person can use to gain access quickly and securely when the time comes.

The same applies to Facebook—naming a Legacy Contact ensures that someone you trust can manage your account, access important photos, or even memorialize it rather than having it disappear over time.

As a friend, I ask each one of you to set up a legacy contact with your devices for your loved ones. If you are a leader and have many club resources that can assist your club members,

name a family member as a Legacy contact, and in time, your club can reach out to your family member to obtain important documents for the club. Also, on a personal level, if you don't have Digital Assets language in your Will, think about adding a paragraph in there.

While these things may not seem urgent now, taking a few minutes to set them up can make things much easier for your loved ones in the future. I just wanted to pass this along in case it can help someone else.

#### **VOUCHERS – What are the differences?**

There was some confusion regarding the GFWC Georgia Vouchers when clubs paid their dues in 2024.

Let's look at the different vouchers and their purposes:

- 2024-2026 GFWC Georgia Voucher This form is used to pay your GFWC Georgia dues of \$25 per member. You can make additional donations to the following on the Voucher:
  - ♦ The Ella F White Endowment Fund This fund helps support GFWC Georgia and its operating costs.
  - ♦ Lipscomb Society This fund helps with the upkeep of our GFWC Georgia state office.
  - ♦ GFWC Georgia President's TFS Special Project Guardians of the Gateway
  - ♦ GFWC Georgia Director of Junior Club's TFS Special Project – Dollars for Collars – Perpetual Scholarship
  - ♦ Student Art Fund This funds our GFWC Georgia annual art awards (See the GFWC Georgia yearbook for further information).

  - ♦ 1734 Society This supports our GFWC Headquarters in Washington, DC These funds are sent to GFWC.
- **Junior Club Voucher**—This is for GFWC Georgia Junior Conference clubs that pay an additional \$2 per member in dues to the Junior Conference.
- Juniorette Voucher This is for GFWC Georgia Juniorette clubs. All of their dues are paid on this voucher.
   They Do Not use the 2024-2026 GFWC Georgia Voucher.
- **District Voucher**—This voucher is for the payment of

your club's district dues, which are paid to your district. All of the information is on the youcher.



- **District Convention Voucher**—This voucher is for each District to pay to GFWC Georgia at the rate of \$1 per member. The funds are used to assist the hosting district with the upcoming GFWC Georgia state convention. Clubs should NOT pay these dues—only the District.
- Tallulah Falls Voucher This voucher is for special donations to the Tallulah Falls School. Details are included on the voucher.

#### **Parliamentary Tips**



Do Committee Recommendations Require a Second???

One Phrase frequently heard in meetings, particularly board meetings, is: "Because the motion is from a committee, it doesn't need a second." But is this actually true? Let's see. First, regardless of your approach, the parliamentary policy won't show up at your meeting. That said, a presiding officer demonstrates leadership by using proper parliamentary phrasing, which helps maintain professionalism and clarity. To begin, we're discussing formal procedures here – situations typically involving larger assemblies, such as annual meetings, conventions, or boards with more than 12 members present. For smaller boards and committees, parliamentary rules are generally less rigid. In fact, Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised includes a whole section on "Procedure in Small Boards" in Chapter 49, which notes that motions in small bodies tend not to require seconds. Further explanation at another time.

In larger or more formal settings, the phrase "A motion from a committee does not need a second" is technically wrong. Here's why: If a committee makes a recommendation to take action, the motion from the committee requires a second, just

like other main motions. However, there's an important nuance: If a motion comes from a committee with more than one member on the committee, the second is already



there. For a motion to come FROM the committee, it must have been supported by multiple committee members. Therefore, the more accurate phrasing is that the committee recommendation "doesn't require an additional second from the floor."

When a committee presents its recommendation and the committee chair ends with "On behalf of the committee, I move .....," the presiding officer can simply say:

"It is moved and seconded that..."

This phrasing acknowledges the committee's endorsement without requiring further action. If clarity is a concern, the chair could also explain:

"Because the motion is from a committee, it already carries a second" {or, "is considered seconded."}

This explanation helps participants understand the process without confusion.

By paying attention to proper phrasing, good chairs can eliminate misunderstandings and ensure smooth, efficient meetings. Clear communication fosters confidence in leadership and helps ensure everyone is on the same page.

#### SUPPORT AND AID WOMEN VETERANS

- Donate comfort and useful items such as soothing lotions and bath gels, beauty products, cozy socks and slippers, adult inspirational coloring books and colored pencils (a great favorite!), games and playing cards, and/or gift cards to salons, coffee shops, and retail and grocery stores.
- Supply beverages and snacks for the waiting area of the Veteran Women's Health Clinic, with a small group of members hosting to provide camaraderie and new contacts.
- Collect new and slightly used jewelry and hold a club social for polishing and packaging the jewelry in decorated boxes or bags for distribution at the Veteran Women's Health Clinic.
- Work with the Veterans Administration Medical Center to hold a games afternoon or painting social. Make new friends and have fun!
- Create "Beauty Bags" for women veterans, including face care, body care, feminine products, and nail care products.
   Provide hand cream, cleansers, brushes, combs, special soaps, shampoo, and bath bombs. Include a special beauty item like a lip gloss or lipstick, earrings or cologne.
- Coordinate with the WVP Manager to help women veterans celebrate special moments in their lives, with gifts and thoughtful cards for new babies, family birthdays, and other meaningful occasions.

\*If your community does not have a WVP Manager, reach out to a local assisted residential living manager that can identify those in their care who are female Veterans.

#### **Beads of Valor to Celebrate Women Veterans**

The Exeter Area GFWC (EAGFWC) Civic Engagement and Outreach Committee brought a special new art therapy program to New Hampshire women veterans at the Manchester VA Medical Center with its first EAGFWC Beads of Valor Workshop, intended to foster a sense of community. Women veterans spent an afternoon designing and making custom, one-of-akind bracelets, which included sharing with others why they chose specific beads, and added certain charms or words. The workshop provided a powerful and meaningful experience for everyone in attendance.

#### Woman's Suffrage National Monument

On December 20, 2024, the U.S. Senate passed H.R. 1318 which authorizes the Women's Suffrage National Monument to be built on the National Mall in Washington, D.C. With the passage of this historic legislation, the Foundation is working with planning agencies across the nation's capital to finalize the location of the monument on the National Mall. The final site on the National Mall is expected to be announced in 2026.

GFWC has established a fund to raise \$150,000 for the Woman's Suffrage monument, with a \$26,000 founding gift for the fund to be contributed by Colonel Carol A. Habgood, USAF Retired, GFWC Parliamentarian.

Of the 40 monuments, memorials, and statues that currently exist on the National Mall – the most visited National Park in the United States – NONE are dedicated to the great women of American history. It is time to tell their stories.

"GFWC's commitment to women's equality began in 1868 when journalist Jane Cunningham Croly attempted to attend a dinner at an all-male press club honoring British novelist Charles Dickens. Because she was a woman, Croly was denied admittance. In response, she formed a women's club that would eventually become known as the General Federation of Women's Clubs. GFWC's history is the history of women's fight for equity and inclusion, and we are honored to be one more chapter in GFWC's story."

The monument will commemorate the suffragists who secured women's right to vote, catalyzed a movement for change, and transformed American democracy.

- Collect books that celebrate women of the suffrage movement or other women and girls of historical or societal importance, and the federal government from denying the right to vote to citizens of the United States on the basis of sex.
- In Commemoration of Woman's Equality Day August 26, 2025- Please consider donating to GFWC's fund to raise money for the Woman's Suffrage Memorial.
- Women's Equality Day is celebrated in the United States on August 26 to commemorate the 1920 adoption of the Nineteenth Amendment (Amendment XIX) to the United States Constitution, which prohibits the United States and states from denying the right to vote to citizens of the United States based on sex.

Honeybees play a crucial role in agriculture. They pollinate \$15 billion worth of crops in the U.S. each year, including more than 130 fruits and vegetables.

Bee populations worldwide are threatened by intensive farming practices, mono-cropping, excessive use of agricultural chemicals, and climate change.

#### Did you know?

- Nearly one-third of our food depends on insects for pollination
- California, Georgia, and Texas are the top 3 states in producing honeybees and queen bees for sale.
- Bees must visit 2 million flowers to produce 1 pound of honey.
- An average worker bee only makes about one-twelfth (1/12) of a teaspoon of honey in her lifetime.

#### So let's Get Fit Within our Communities -----fit in body, in mind, and in spirit.



Regular physical activity improves these components, leading to better health, energy, mental well-being, and a reduced risk of chronic diseases. GFWC clubs are encouraged to integrate physical fitness activities during club meetings. If you don't meet during the summer, challenge your

members by using an app such as Charity Miles or FitBit Challenge. During your meetings, practice chair yoga, line dancing, balance training, or flexibility exercises.

**Physical fitness** refers to a person's ability to perform daily activities with optimal performance, endurance, and strength while managing fatigue and stress. It includes several key components:

- Cardiovascular endurance the ability of the heart and lungs to supply oxygen during sustained physical activity (e.g., running, cycling)
- **Muscular strength** the amount of force a muscle can produce (e.g., weightlifting).
- **Muscular endurance** the ability of muscles to perform repeated actions over time without tiring.
- Flexibility the range of motion around joints (e.g., stretching, yoga).
- **Body composition** the ratio of fat to lean mass (muscles, bones, organs) in the body

June is World Elder Abuse Awareness Month

June 15th is Elder Abuse Awareness Day

#### Do you know there are six different kinds of Elder Abuse?

- → Physical abuse using physical force to coerce or to inflict bodily harm. It often, but not always, causes physical discomfort, pain, or injury. It may include the willful deprivation of essential services, such as medical care, food, or water.
- ★ Emotional abuse using tactics, such as harassment, insults, intimidation, isolation, or threats that cause mental or emotional anguish. It diminishes the person's sense of identity, dignity, and self-worth.
- ★ Sexual abuse any sexual behavior directed towards an at -risk adult without the person's full knowledge and consent. A spouse, partner, family member, or other trusted person can perpetrate sexual abuse.
- → Financial abuse or exploitation improperly or illegally using a person's resources for the benefit of another person, for example, using a Power of Attorney to gain access to an adult's assets for personal gain or using undue influence, false representation, and other means to gain access to an adult's

monthly government checks.

- → Neglect occurs when a caregiver refuses or fails to provide essential services (food, water, shelter, medical care, etc.) to the degree that it harms or threatens to harm an older and/or disabled adult.
- ★ Self-neglect failing to perform essential self-care, such as depriving oneself of necessities such as food, water, or medication. Consciously putting oneself in harm's way or being unable to handle the needs of day-to-day living because of medical, mental health, or other disabilities. Self-neglect is not a crime.

What can you do if you suspect abuse, neglect, or exploitation? Call 911 if someone is in immediate danger.

If you suspect the abuse, neglect, or exploitation of an older or disabled adult, contact the Division of Aging Services'
Adult Protective Services Central Intake at 1-866-552-4464 and select "3".

#### What can your club do?

Plan an event at a nursing home with games, songs, and snacks. Add a few prizes like socks, individually wrapped snacks, lotion, nail care items, and anything else the nursing staff might suggest that the seniors need. Hand out an Elder Abuse flyer to the residents or announce the six different types of Elder Abuse.

And then join our very own Julie Walters for some reporting



As we begin the second half of 2025, please take note of your club's work on the GFWC Legislative Ladder. Has your club completed any of the tasks? Yes/No?

Over the next six months, sufficient time remains to complete the tasks needed to earn the goal of 35+ points. What, you say! Your club members are not familiar with the GFWC Legislative Ladder. No worries. Here's a quick summary.

During 2024-2026, GFWC clubs are being challenged to "step up" to EDUCATE, ENGAGE, and EMPOWER through specific Legislative advocacy steps that do not need to be completed sequentially. The document is available on pages 170-171 of the Legislation/Public Policy section of the 2024-2026 GFWC Club Manual and can also be accessed through the GFWC member portal at this site:

https://memberportal.gfwc.org/resources/legislation-public -policy/311/gfwc-legislative-ladder fillable

Clubs achieving 35+ points will be recognized during the 2025 and 2026 GFWC Annual Conventions. While it is too late to be recognized during the 2025 Convention in Atlanta, Georgia's Women's Clubs can be recognized for their Legislative work *that is completed this year* at the 2026 annual GFWC Convention!

Achieving 35 points is not out of reach. If your club increases enrollment by 10% annually in the

Legislative Action Center (LAC), you will earn 25 points! Ten percent is doable!

Here's an excellent project for your club! During your meetings, invite clubwomen to go to <a href="https://">https://</a>

/mobile/GFWC/home

www.votervoice.net/mobile/GFWC/home to add their name and email address. Look for "SIGN UP FOR ALERTS" on the right side of the screen. To make it EASY, simply open this QR Code.

Whenever there is a current legislative issue important to GFWC members (like domestic violence, online safety for children, or support for Alzheimer's patients and caregivers), LAC members are alerted and may take action immediately if they choose to do so. Remind your club members that GFWC is **nonpartisan**.

Be sure your club members are on the lookout for a Legislative Alert regarding VAWA funding (Violence Against Women Act) that will be sent after the GFWC Convention in June! Our GFWC Georgia goal is that each state club will increase its LAC membership by 10% - and that's very doable! Additionally, EACH CLUB SISTER will be completing GFWC Georgia's "Cathy Jones' President's Challenge" – to join the LAC!

So, let's aim to be recognized in 2026 for our work on the GFWC's Legislative Ladder!



How else can your club earn Legislative Ladder points? Another way is to connect a club project to a GFWC Resolution. Explaining the relationship between the club project and resolution will add 15 points to your score. Let's see, 25 points for LAC membership and 15 points for project and resolution equals 40 points, and with that total score, your club would be recognized at the annual GFWC Convention!

WHEREAS, Educational professionals, including teachers, teacher assistants, and other educational staff, are often underpaid, overworked, and underappreciated, resulting in burnout and shortages; and

WHEREAS, Wages directly affect the ability of school districts to recruit and retain educational professionals; and

WHEREAS, Educational professionals regularly purchase essential school supplies in excess of the deduction allowed by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS); therefore

RESOLVED, That the General Federation of Women's Clubs urges its member clubs to:

- Advocate for increased local, state, and federal funding to offer educational professionals a living wage, which will encourage quality teacher candidates as well as the retention of all educational professionals;
- Endorse increasing the allowable deduction for essential school supplies;
- Support educational professionals through donations of classroom supplies, adopt-a-classroom-type programs, and recognition events.

**EXAMPLE of a CLUB PROJECT:** Many GFWC GA clubs support local schools by providing school supplies, teacher treats, and student recognition in the arts. Such endeavors and outreach are directly related to GFWC Resolution 150-045. This example is one of several that clubs can provide on the Legislative Ladder.

So, will your club be recognized next year during the GFWC Convention for your work on GFWC's Legislative Ladder? Let's make GFWC Georgia proud. Note that only individual clubs may submit their Legislative Ladder in 2026.



## GFWC At a Glance

2025 GFWC International Day of Service — September 27, 2025



The General Federation of Women's Club (GFWC) is united in its dedication to volunteer community service. The GFWC International Day of Service (IDS), formerly known as GFWC National Day of Service, launched in 2023, spotlights an area of need in communities across the nation and around the world to bring about positive change.

Every two years a new topic is selected by the GFWC Executive Committee. The 2023 and 2024 GFWC IDS focused on ending food insecurity and hunger in the United States and across the world. GFWC clubs organize community service projects in their communities to raise public awareness and gather the resources necessary to help those in need based on the year's theme.

The 2025 General Federation of Women's Clubs (GFWC) will focus on *domestic and sexual violence*.

According to the World Health Organization, it is estimated that between 736 million to 852 million women, aged 15 years or older, have experienced domestic and sexual violence. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, more than 16 million people in the United States are affected annually.

Community service projects for the 2025 GFWC IDS can focus on any area of domestic and sexual violence. Here are eight areas your club might consider:

- Campus Sexual Assault
- Child Abuse
- Elder Abuse
- Human Trafficking for Sexual Purposes
- Intimate Partner Violence
- Military Sexual Assault
- Teen Dating Violence
- Violence Against Native American Women

# ACTION-ORIENTED SERVICE PROJECT IDEAS

For clubs aiming for immediate and lasting impact, consider these hands-on initiatives:

- Survivor Support Kits: Assemble and distribute personalized care packages with essential hygiene items, clothing, and motivational notes.
- Emergency Relocation Assistance: Provide transportation, hotel stays, or security deposits for survivors escaping dangerous situations.
- Home Restoration Projects: Partner with local contractors to refurbish and furnish transitional housing for survivors and their families.
- Legal Aid Support: Coordinate an event with attorneys offering pro bono services to assist survivors in obtaining restraining orders, custody agreements, or financial restitution.
- Children's Comfort Projects: Stock shelters with backpacks filled with books, school supplies, and comfort items for children affected by domestic violence.
- Pet Protection Initiative: Arrange temporary foster care or donation drives for pet food and supplies to assist survivors who hesitate to leave due to concern for their animals.
- Survivor Employment Assistance: Set up job skills training workshops, resume-building sessions, and career coaching services for survivors re-entering the workforce.
- Meal Prep for Shelters: Organize a team to prepare and deliver healthy meals for shelters, ensuring residents have access to nutritious food.
- Mobile Resource Units: Arrange for mobile advocacy vans to travel to underserved areas, providing on-site counseling and legal resources.

## GFWC JUNIOR CLUB LEADERSHIP CERTIFICATION

### FOR JUNIOR & JUNIORETTE CLUBS

ne of the greatest benefits a club member can gain from membership in GFWC is leadership experience and personal development that can support the member in club work and in many other areas of life. The GFWC Leadership Toolkit provides a variety of materials and can be utilized to offer learning opportunities for clubs and club members, and a host of external resources are available to support leadership development.

I am proud to introduce to you the Junior Club Leadership Certification to provide a structured pathway for clubs to provide leadership and personal development. Completion of this program demonstrates a club's commitment to educating members on GFWC and supporting leadership and personal development for its individual members.

The Junior Club Leadership Certification is available to all GFWC Junior and Juniorette Clubs to provide a benefit in support of recruitment and retention. Clubs earning the Certification will be recognized at GFWC Convention, on the GFWC website, and on social media. They will have access to an exclusive graphic for use in club materials and on social media.

Each of the eight topics will be offered as a live webinar, with an

opportunity for Q&A and discussion. In this initial year of content offerings, two topics will be covered in each webinar. A recorded version of the topics will be released post-webinar, along with discussion questions to support on-demand learning. Additional resources and suggested reading lists will be provided for each topic. These resources will be available in the GFWC Member Portal. Additional topics will be covered in future Administrations.

To earn the Junior Club Leadership Certification for the 2024-2026 Administration, a club must complete an online form (available after the webinars have all been presented) by April 1, 2026, that will include the following:

Declaration that at least 50% of club members have taken part in the Zoom webinars or viewed the on-demand offerings, for all eight (8) topics.

- A short narrative explaining how your club promoted the content and encouraged member participation.
- Evaluation of the Certification program
- Once a club has earned the Leadership Certification, criteria will be established to retain Certification.

Online registration for these webinars will be found on the GFWC Member Portal prior to each webinar. Clubs can watch the webinars and complete the topics on their own schedule.


